## Torrey Paces Deena Drossin At Chicago Marathon

A number of Arkansans went to the Chicago Marathon recently but for some reason nobody volunteered to do an article about it.

So I asked Hall of Fame Runner Bill Torrey if he would write one. His answer was NO. Figuring he was kidding I said really, will you. He said my answer last time was NO...now it's HEL...

Okay, okay, I interrupted, I get it. Well then, I asked, is it okay if I interview you about the race. I really need something. That you can do, Torrey replied. I am very comfortable with the media and getting my name and picture in the paper and on TV.

The interview is as follows:

Bill, tell me about your race at the Chicago Marathon. (I started off with the hard questions first to try and throw him off guard).

It went really well, considering I didn't think my training went well. But I am a Hall of Fame runner so I should do well.

How was the weather and crowd on race day?

I thought everything was okey dokey. Race management had me line up behind the Kenyans. I'm about as well known in Chicago as I am here in Arkansas. They knew if I got

my picture in the paper that it would add even more status to their race.

And...

They were right. I got my picture in the paper and they told me they expect to break 40,000 next year.

WOW, you ran with the Kenyans?

Well, I started out behind them but in the second mile I saw Deena Drossin and we started talking. She told me that her

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pacers had gotten sick that morning and asked me to pace her for 20 miles. I decided to give up my race and do her the favor. She is, after all, an Olympic medalist. Who knows, I may need a favor some day.

Didn't she end up winning in 2:21 and change? You must've really slowed after 20, huh?

Not really. Yeah I ended up in 3:17 but there were circumstances involved.

Why sure, there was my wife Carol, Geneva Hampton, Gina Pharis and three or four other ladies representing the Little Rock Marathon.

You were there with six or seven females. What was that like?

I felt like Larry Graham on prom night.

I guess that's every man's fantasy but who ran the marathon?

Well, Carol had a 4:45 and Geneva ran a 4:24. Gina and the others provided a lot of support along the race course too.

Did you see anybody else I could mention?

If you must. James Terbrack always runs this race and had a 3:24 this year. The ageless wonder, Don Potter, ran a 4:05 and was tenth in his age group. Don's 68, you know, but he looks younger than David Williams.

Also, Bill Bulloch and Lee Wyant were entered but couldn't make it. They had other things to do that day. I believe Bill had to count bags of rice and Lee had to fill a cavity.

Well, thanks Bill, that should be enough. I really appreciate it and I know the running community does too. Also, this may be my best shot yet for a Pulitzer.

Oh, it's been my pleasure Duck. And if you do get any remuneration for this I expect at least 50% of it.

Those of you who know Bill Torrey need to thank him personally next time you see him for that very insightful interview. He was very sweet to take time out of his busy schedule to tell us about his trip.

Barbie Hildebrand was ninth overall in 20:32 and Karen Irico ran a 22:59. Ginea Qualls finished in 23:25 and Brooke Nalley ran a 24:37. Carol Torrey came across the finish line in 24:48.

I've heard through word of mouth a few other members who ran or walked this race. The cancer survivors I know of are Bettina Brownstein, Rhonda Ferguson and Nancy Collins. Ivy Harrison and Tina Coutu ran or walked in honor of one/all of the survivors.

Tina and Rhonda also went to Palo Duro Canyon (Texas) where I understand Rhonda scrambled over rocks and did some bushwhacking while trying

to reach a summit. She then walked and ran six miles on the trail course.

Tina completed the 20K *FUN* run and was the second female finisher overall but the *first* Arkansan. Other Arkansans who entered and finished the 50 mile run were Kimmie Riley, Patty Groth and Carrie DuPriest. Way to go ladies!

I would also like to congratulate my good friend and long time running partner Arthur Kerns on his 3:59:07 finish in the Mt. Desert Marathon in Bar Harbor Maine. He not only qualified for Boston but he won his 65-69 age division by almost three hours.

Arthur also beat the Governor's marathon time pretty easily ... and that may be the most important thing to him.

That about covers it for this edition of the results. I plan on being at the Spa and Duck runs so please stop by and tell me all about the races you've run recently. Who knows, you may even be the next person interviewed for my next column.

## Pre-Holiday Fun Run And Breakfast Pigout At Marstons' Estate

"Rose and Bob's Fun Run and Pre-Holidays Bacon and Pancake Practice Pigout" will be Saturday, December 17, 2005, at 8 a.m. That means that Rosemary and Bob Marston are providing food and drink at their lovely home in the suburbs of Roland. Free parking will be available at the Marston Estate. Visitors can run or walk on the roads or trails. Markings and maps will be available at the parking lot.

Directions: Take Highway 10 (Cantrell) west to the stop light at Wal-Mart. Go right at the light on Chenal Boulevard, which turns into Highway 300. Go north on 300 past Pinnacle Mountain and through Natural Steps until you see a yield sign as you enter Roland. Turn left at the yield sign onto Henry Street, go 200 yards and the road bends around and becomes West Street. Go 200 yards on West to the stop sign and turn left onto Roland Cutoff Road. Go two miles to Wild Oak Lane, which is a left turn off of the Cutoff Road. Go to the end of Wild Oak and proceed straight up into the woods to the house. The journey takes 25 minutes to get there from the intersection of I-430 and Cantrell.

If these directions aren't clear enough call 868-1072. Just don't call so early that you wake up the hosts. They might not be so hospitable.
